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INTRODUCTION

Thank you for purchasing a Parker Hannifin monitor. You can mount the monitor in a control enclosure or on an adjustable arm. It can be used with any model of the PowerStation industrial computer family or with other computers that run Windows® operating systems.

This manual is for use with both the PHM monitor containing the Hampshire touchscreen controller, as well as the PM monitor containing the 3M/Dynapro touchscreen controller. If you have purchased a PM monitor with a 3M/Dynapro controller, use the installation instructions in *Appendix B: PM1 Monitor Installation* of this manual.

This manual is designed to help you set up and use your Parker Hannifin monitor and is divided into the following chapters:

Chapter 1 - Introduction: Presents an overview of this manual, any other documentation provided with the monitor, and how to contact customer support services.

Getting Started

Now that you have opened the monitor package, you are ready to unpack the unit and install it in a permanent location. Follow the steps below to get started.

- 1 Unpack the monitor and verify that you have received all of the components you ordered.
- 2 Install the monitor in a permanent location. See Chapter 2, *Installing the Monitor*, for complete installation instructions.
- 3 Connect the monitor to a computer—either to a PowerStation or another computer supporting an analog video output connector. See Chapter 3, *Connecting to a Computer* for more information
- 4 Start up your system and follow the detailed instructions for setting up the monitor described in *Setting Up the Monitor* on page 3-4.

INSTALLING THE MONITOR

You can install the monitor by mounting it in a control enclosure or on an adjustable arm. This chapter explains how to select an appropriate location for the monitor and how to mount it in an enclosure.

If you are mounting the monitor on an adjustable arm, refer to the documentation that accompanies the arm for installation instructions.

Selecting a Location

The first step when installing the monitor is to select an appropriate location for the unit. This is the most important aspect of the installation process because the location you select affects the monitor's performance, ease of use and life-expectancy. This section provides guidelines to follow when selecting a location.

Underwriters Laboratories Approval

In order to obtain Underwriters Laboratories (UL) approval for your monitor installation, the installation must meet the following criteria:

- 1 The monitor must be mounted in a standard industrial enclosure that provides fire protection.
- 2 The monitor must be mounted in an enclosure that meets a Type 4 rating.

Class I, Division 2 Guidelines

If you purchased a Class I, Division 2-compliant monitor, it is suitable for use in Groups A, B, C, and D hazardous locations *only*. You must follow these guidelines in order to maintain a safe operating environment.



Warning **Explosion Hazard** — Do not disconnect equipment, replace or insert cards unless the power has been switched off, or the area is known to be safe.

Substitution of components may impair suitability for Class I, Division 2.

Environmental Guidelines

The environment is the area where the monitor is located. In general, select a place that limits the unit's exposure to adverse conditions such as dust, oil, moisture, condensation and corrosive vapors.

Touchscreen Considerations

The monitor's touchscreen is designed to meet the Type 4 rating. Mount the monitor in an enclosure that supports this rating in order to provide further protection.

The monitor's touchscreen is resistant to a variety of chemicals. It can resist the chemicals listed below with no visible effect.

Make sure that the touchscreen is not exposed to chemicals other than those listed in the table above.

Important The system is only rated Type 4 when it is installed in a UL listed Type 4X enclosure.

Electrical Guidelines

To minimize unwanted electrical interference, select a location away from machinery that produces intense electrical noise (arc welders, for example). If you cannot avoid electrical noise, isolate input power to the unit and separate all data communication cables from AC power lines.

Important Use the monitor ground stud to connect the unit to a suitable ground reference, such as earth ground or building steel. This ensures the unit is in compliance with immunity and emissions requirements necessary for proper operation.

All serial communication cables should be 100% shielded with the shield tied to chassis ground only at one end of the cable.

The monitor's electrical specifications are shown in the table below.

Make sure that your power source is compatible with the monitor before starting the unit.

The monitor accepts DC input only. To apply AC power, you must use an AC adapter. You can purchase an AC adapter from your local distributor.



Caution: The monitor's power supply automatically detects the input voltage level and adjusts accordingly. However, always use reliable sources of power and isolate all communication cables from AC power lines to enhance noise immunity.

Field Terminal Wiring Requirements

In order to comply with UL requirements, use copper wire with 60C or 60/75C insulation and a tightening torque of 7.0 lb/in. (0.79 N-m) when connecting field terminal wiring to the monitor.

Temperature and Humidity Guidelines

You can safely operate the monitor within the temperature range specified in the table below.

Faceplate Design	Tested for UL Type 4/4X environment Warning: The monitor is rated NEMA 4 only if it is installed in a NEMA 4 rated enclosure.

Important: Limit the monitor's exposure to adverse conditions, such as dust, oil, moisture, and corrosive vapors in order to minimize maintenance and repair costs.

Be sure to choose an area for the monitor that is free from moisture or condensing humidity.

Enclosure Guidelines

Select an enclosure that is large enough to allow free airflow in and around the monitor.



Caution: Remember that the temperature within a protective enclosure is generally higher than the external temperature. Thus, if the monitor is operating inside an enclosure at temperature levels above its rated ambient temperature, you must cool the enclosure.

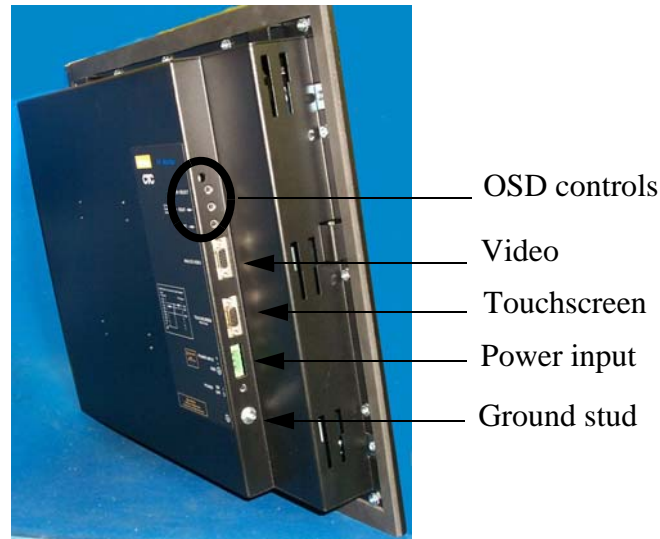
You should allow a minimum of 2 inches between the inside of the enclosure and the top, bottom, sides, and back of the monitor. Make sure that the surface where the unit meets the front panel of the enclosure is flat in order to ensure a Type type 4 seal.

Refer to the CD that came with your monitor for dimensional drawings.

Accessing Ports and Other Controls

As shown in Figure 2-1, a +24VDC power input port, touchscreen port, analog video input port and the on-screen display controls (OSD) are located on the left side of the unit in all models of the monitor. Be sure to design your enclosure with these locations in mind.

Figure 2-1: Monitor Ports



Important To be compliant with CE EMC emission requirements under EN55011, all video, serial, and parallel port communication cables must be 100% braided shielded cable.

Radiated Emissions Guidelines

This monitor has been tested to comply with international electromagnetic and emission standards. To reduce radiated emissions, ensure that there is a good earth connection to the monitor, you can do this by using the grounding stud located on the left-side of the chassis. Use the shortest possible, heavy gage wire or braided cable to make this connection.

Verify low-resistance (<0.5 ohms) continuity with an ohmmeter for proper grounding. In addition, be sure all communication cables are shielded and grounded only on one side.

Mounting the Monitor in an Enclosure

Read this section if you intend to mount the monitor in an enclosure. If you plan to mount the monitor on an adjustable arm, see the documentation that accompanies the arm for installation instructions.

Creating a Cutout

When mounting the monitor in an enclosure, you first need to create a cutout for the unit and clean the area of any dirt or debris that might come in contact with the monitor.

- 1 Measure the cutout dimensions as shown in the table below.

15" (stainless steel bezel)	12.40" (315mm)	15.90" (404mm)

- 2 Cut out the marked area. The cutout dimensions depend upon the size of your monitor. To maintain the flatness of the mounting surface, it is recommended that you punch out the mounting hole, as you should maintain proper surface flatness and edge quality.

Refer to the CD that comes with the monitor for the depth and port dimensions of your monitor. Use these dimensions to customize the mounting of your unit.

Important If using an external AC adapter, remember to take the adapter's dimensions into account when planning the depth of the monitor enclosure.

- 3 Debur the edges of the cutout area, removing dirt and debris that might come in contact with the unit.

Mounting an External AC Adapter

The monitor uses DC power. You can however, operate the monitor using AC power by ordering an optional external AC adapter.

The External AC Power Supply Adapter (P1X-PWRAC) is available from Parker-CTC, along with an installation kit (BKT-1000) that allows you to mount the adapter either on the back of the monitor or near it.



Caution Do not apply AC power to the unit without the AC adapter or damage may occur.

To mount the adapter on the back of the monitor:

- 1 Place the monitor face-down on a static dissipative mat in a location free from dirt and moisture and protected against static discharge.
- 2 Place the external AC adapter between the four mounting holes in the center, as shown in Figure 2-2 : *Mounting an External AC Adapter*. Make sure that the adapter's DC connection is toward the top of the monitor and that the AC connection is toward the bottom.
- 3 Place the two adapter mounting clamps over the top and bottom of the adapter, as shown in the illustration. Align the holes in the clamps with the mounting holes in the back of the monitor. Notice that the lower mounting clamp has a special extension that reaches down over the AC connection and holds it in place.
- 4 Fasten the adapter to the monitor with the four retaining screws included in the adapter installation kit. The completed installation should look like the illustration below.

Figure 2-2: Mounting an External AC Adapter

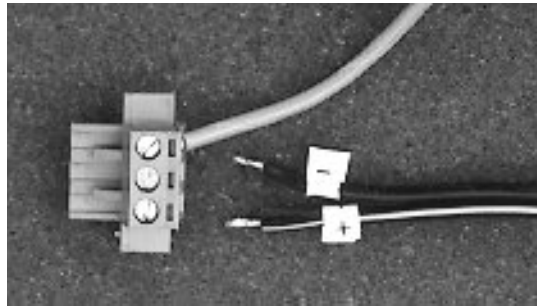


For instructions on how to mount the external AC adapter near the monitor, see the documentation that accompanies the adapter installation kit.

Preparing the Power Connector

Prepare the power source for the unit by sliding the positive and negative wires into the appropriate slots on the power connector as shown in Figure 2-3 : *Power Connector*.

Connect the ground cable from the power connector to an earth ground.

Mounting the Monitor

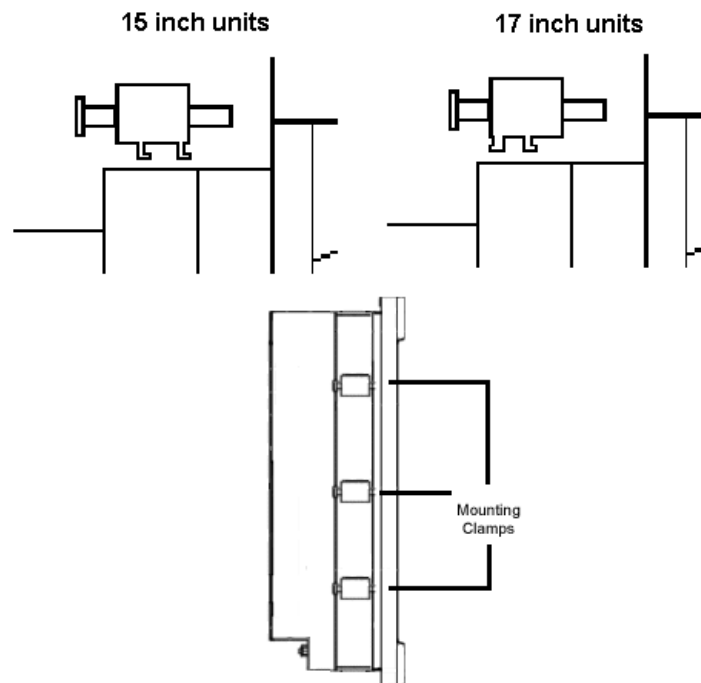
There are two styles of clamps used to mount the monitor to your enclosure depending on the display size. Both styles are illustrated in Figure 2-4 : *Mounting the Clamp Diagram* below. When mounting the monitor, note that the 15" monitor uses 8 clamps to mount in its enclosure, while the 17" monitor uses 12 clamps.

To mount the monitor:

- 1 Slide the monitor into the cutout from the front.
- 2 Attach the mounting clamps, with their screws, to the back of the unit in the spaces provided.
 - If you have a 15" monitor, attach 8 mounting clamps, with their screws, to the back of the monitor in the spaces provided. Place 2 clamps at the top and bottom of the monitor and 2 on each side.
 - If you have a 17" monitor, attach 12 mounting clamps, with their screws, to the back of the monitor in the spaces provided. Place 3 clamps at the top and bottom of the monitor and 3 on each side.

The clamps secure to the unit using CTC's sliding mechanism. Insert the clamp into the wide end of the slot and slide it to the thin end. See Figure 2-4 : *Mounting the Clamp Diagram* on page 2-9.

- 3 Slide the feet of the mounting clip into the slot, then slide the clip over to properly mount the unit.
- 4 Tighten each of the mounting screws against the front of the enclosure.
- 5 Torque the screws to **7 in/lbs.**



Caution: Do not over-tighten the screw/clamp assemblies or you may damage the monitor. However, under-tightening may not guarantee a Type 4 seal.

- 6 Tighten the screws in a crosswise sequence to ensure a good seal and prevent damage. Tightening the bracket assembly may not ensure that the gasket seal is totally depressed by the bezel. You may see a small gap between the bezel and the enclosure.

After you have mounted the monitor, you are ready to connect the monitor to a computer, start up your system, and if necessary, set up the monitor. Instructions for these activities are described in Chapter 3, *Connecting to a Computer*.

CONNECTING TO A COMPUTER

The monitor is designed to be used with a computer—either a PowerStation or another computer running MS-DOS or Windows 98, NT 4.0, Embedded NT, 2000, or XP. If you purchased a PowerStation with your monitor, your complete PowerStation system is set up and ready for you to use once you connect the components.

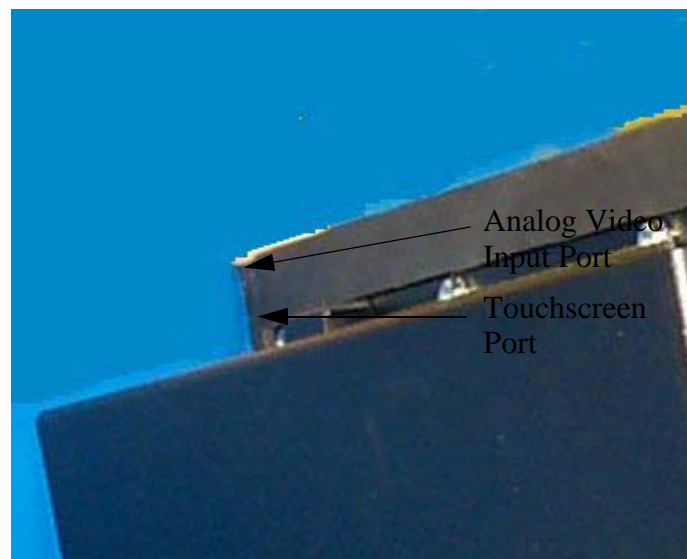
However, if you are connecting your monitor to another computer, you need to complete the setup procedures described in this chapter, including: how to connect the monitor to your computer, how to prepare the monitor to work with your computer, and how to read and adjust the on-screen display (OSD).

Connecting to a Non-display PowerStation

To connect your monitor to one of the non-display PowerStations, complete the following steps:

- 1 Connect the 15-pin video cable to the Analog Video Input port on both the monitor and the non-display PowerStation, see Figure 3-1.
- 2 Connect the 9-pin touchscreen cable to the Touchscreen port on the monitor and to the COM2(B) communication port.

Connecting to Other Computers

To connect your monitor to a generic computer running MS-DOS or Windows, complete the following steps:

- 1 Connect the 15-pin video cable to the Analog Video Input port at the left side of the monitor and to the 15-pin video port on your computer, see Figure 3-1 : *Communication Ports on the Monitor* on page 3-1.
- 2 Connect the 9-pin touchscreen cable to the Touchscreen port on the monitor and to the 9-pin serial port on your computer to use for touchscreen communications.

Starting Up

Once you have connected your monitor to the non-display PowerStation or to another computer, you are ready to start your system.

However, before connecting power to your unit, make sure that you have read and understood the electrical and testing specifications described in Appendix A, *Monitor Specifications*. Also, make sure that you follow the guidelines listed below:

- **For permanently connected equipment**, a readily accessible disconnect device must be incorporated in the fixed wiring.
- **For pluggable equipment**, the socket-outlet must be installed near the equipment and should be easily accessible.

Important Proper installation of the monitor for use in European Union countries requires the use of a harmonized power cord. (The power cord must be identified with the <HAR> symbol.) Make sure that the monitor is only connected to the main supply with a harmonized power cord.

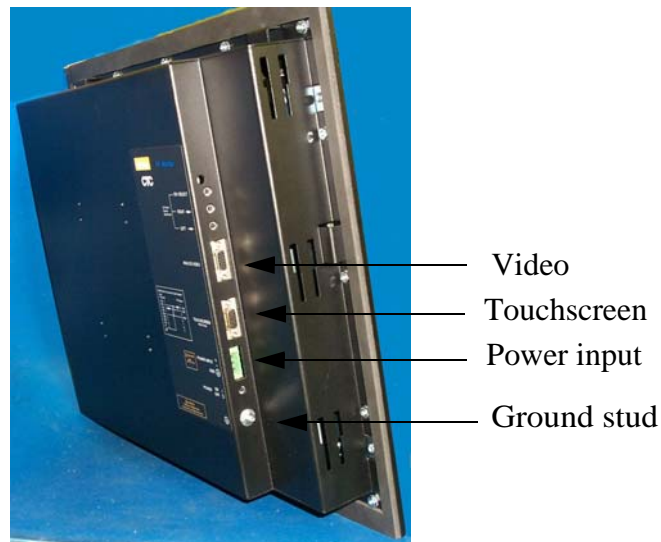
To Start Up Your System

- 1 Connect the power cord to the Power Input port on the left side of the monitor and to the voltage source (see Figure 3-2).



Warning Voltage input to the unit should be within the range specified in *Electrical Specifications* in Appendix A.

- 2 Connect the ground stud on the lower left side of the monitor to an effective, known earth ground (see Figure 3-2).
- 3 Connect your computer to a power source.
- 4 Turn on the computer.
- 5 Turn on the monitor.

Setting Up the Monitor

If you connect the monitor to a non-display PowerStation, your system should now be completely installed and functioning. The monitor and PowerStation are already configured with the proper settings. Refer to this section only if you need to make adjustments to your monitor in the future.

If you connect the monitor to a generic computer, you need to complete the following steps so that the monitor works with your computer.

- *Step 1: Installing the Touchscreen Driver*
- *Step 2: Calibrating the Touchscreen*
- *Step 3: Adjusting the Video Image*

Step1: Installing the Touchscreen Driver

If you purchased a CTC non-display PowerStation with your monitor, a touchscreen driver was installed in your PowerStation before it shipped.

If you are using your monitor with another computer, or if your system becomes damaged, you need to install (or reinstall) the touchscreen driver.

To install the touchscreen driver, use the product CD that came with the monitor.

- 1 Load the CD. The PHM/PM Monitor Utility CD menu is displayed.
- 2 Click on **Drivers** from the menu on the left-hand side of the screen. The Drivers menu is displayed.
- 3 Click on **PHM Monitor Drivers**. The TSHARC driver installation is launched.
- 4 Follow the online instructions to install the touchscreen driver.

The touchscreen driver used with the monitor is the Hampshire TSHARC driver. This driver is located on the CD that shipped with your monitor in the following folder:

Drivers → Touch → PHM

This driver is also located on the OS image in the following directory:

C:\TSHARC

Review the *Install Readme.txt* file associated with the touchscreen driver for more information on installing it, if necessary.

Step 2: Calibrating the Touchscreen

Calibrating the touchscreen ensures that it is aligned with your display. The monitor's touchscreen is calibrated before leaving Parker-CTC. However, you may need to recalibrate the touchscreen when you begin using the monitor for the first time or whenever the cursor does not follow the touches on the screen.

This section explains how to calibrate the Hampshire touchscreen driver under Windows 2000 and XP Professional.

To calibrate the touchscreen driver, complete the following steps:

- 1 Select **Start→Programs→Hampshire TSHARC Control Panel**. The control panel appears.
- 2 Follow the on screen instructions for selecting which monitor to calibrate. If you just have one monitor, select **1**.
- 3 Select the **Calibrate** tab.
- 4 Click the center of where the arrows are pointing. The Calibration screen appears.
- 5 Touch the target where it appears on the screen, hold your finger there momentarily, and then release. The screen guides you through the Touch - Hold - Release process.
- 6 Repeat the process three more times in the other three corners of the screen. A test screen appears.
- 7 Move your finger across the monitor. The target should move with your finger. If so, the calibration was successful.
- 8 Select **Accept**.
- 9 On the control panel, select **Apply** and then select **OK**.

Note If the touchscreen still does not appear calibrated, and the cursor moves vertically when your finger moves horizontally on the screen or vice versa, the touchscreen cable may not be connected to the motherboard properly. Call a CTC customer service representative.

Step 3: Adjusting the Video Image

The monitor is equipped with an on screen display (OSD) that allows you to adjust the video image for the best possible picture.

By default, the OSD is set to Auto which automatically adjusts all OSD settings to their optimum values. However, you can manually make adjustments by using the three buttons at the upper left side of the monitor.

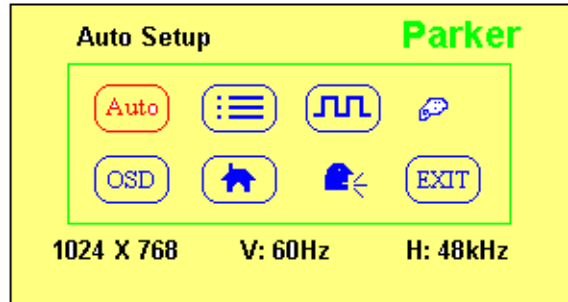
The buttons work as follows:

- **MENU/SELECT** — Switches the OSD on and off. When a particular setting is highlighted that you want to adjust, press this button again to select the submenu. In most cases, this displays a control bar showing the increase or decrease in adjustment.
- **RIGHT** — Functions like an arrow key on a keyboard, enabling you to progress through the OSD icons in order to select the setting you want to adjust. Once you have selected a setting, this button enables you to increase the value of the adjustment.
- **LEFT** — Functions like an arrow key on a keyboard, enabling you to reverse through the OSD icons in order to select the setting you want to adjust. Once you have selected a setting, this button enables you to decrease the value of the adjustment.

The first time that you change the monitor’s resolution, it attempts to automatically adjust the settings. You may see a slight shifting of the video image as the monitor finds the optimal settings. Once the new resolution is set up, the monitor remembers these settings and uses them each time that resolution is chosen.

When you press the Menu/Select button, a menu similar to Figure 3-3, is displayed. This figure shows the Auto Setup icon selected.

The following settings are available based on the selection in the OSD menu.

OSD Display	Allows moving the OSD menu around the screen: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • H. Position - select to move the OSD menu horizontally. • V. Position - select to move the OSD menu vertically.
Factory Recall	Sets the display to the default settings of a typical video display. These settings may not be optimum for your particular monitor.

Exit	Select to exit the OSD menu.

To adjust the video image on your monitor, complete the following steps:

- 1 Press the **MENU/SELECT** button to display the OSD.
- 2 Use the **RIGHT/LEFT** buttons to choose the icon for the adjustment you want to make.
- 3 Press the **MENU/SELECT** button to activate the adjustment you want to make.

In most settings you are presented with a control bar for making your adjustment. Use the **RIGHT/LEFT** buttons to move the control bar to the desired value.

In other settings you simply select the option then use the **MENU/SELECT** button to configure the option.

The results of your changes are immediately visible. The monitor remembers all OSD adjustments so that you do not need to repeat them each time you turn on the monitor.

Note If the OSD is turned on and then left unattended, it automatically shuts off in 15 seconds.

MAINTAINING THE MONITOR

The monitor has been designed to provide years of trouble-free operation even in the harshest environments. However, occasionally you need to perform routine maintenance on some of the monitor's components.

This chapter provides instructions on monitor maintenance, as well as steps for troubleshooting problems that may occur in operation.

Cleaning the Screen

Occasionally, you may need to clean the monitor's screen. Clean the screen using warm, soapy water and a cloth. You can also use any non-abrasive cleaner. See *Faceplate Chemical Resistance* on page A-4, for a list of substances the screen can resist with no visible effect.

Do not use any harsh material or powder, such as steel wool or abrasive cleansers, to clean the screen surface. The surface is sensitive to scraping, sharp blows, or punctures. Therefore, keep screwdrivers or other sharp objects away from the screen surface.



Warning Do **not** clean the unit while it is running. Turn off the monitor before cleaning it in order to avoid inadvertently activating the touchscreen.

Recalibrating the Touchscreen

Your touchscreen was calibrated by Parker CTC before your monitor was shipped. However, you may need to recalibrate the touchscreen when you begin using the monitor for the first time, when you connect the monitor to a new computer, or whenever the cursor location and the place on the screen where the user touches do not match. See *Step 2: Calibrating the Touchscreen* in Chapter 3, for instructions on how to recalibrate your touchscreen.

Performing Internal Maintenance

The only internal maintenance necessary is replacing the fuse. To prevent injury to yourself and/or damage to the monitor, be sure to read and understand the procedures in this section before performing them.

This section discusses the following:

- Electrostatic Discharge Precautions
- Opening and closing the backshell
- Replacing a fuse

Electrostatic Discharge (ESD) Precautions



Modern integrated electronic devices, including the monitor, are extremely sensitive to electrostatic discharges (ESD) and fields. Before you open the system, be sure to follow these simple precautions to protect you and the monitor from harm resulting from ESD.

- Always disconnect power from the monitor before opening or removing the backshell. **Do not** touch any components of the monitor while the monitor is on.
- Disconnect power before performing any internal maintenance or troubleshooting.
- Only handle internal components of the monitor in an ESD-safe location, using appropriate grounding methods.
- Wear a grounding wrist strap for continuous protection.
- Always ground yourself to remove any static charge before you touch the video controller board inside the monitor's backshell.
- Be particularly careful not to touch the components on the video controller board.
- Keep any monitor part in its anti-static packaging when it is not installed in the monitor and place it on a static dissipative mat when you are working on it.

Opening and Closing the Backshell

In order to perform internal maintenance on the monitor, you have to open and close the backshell of the unit. ***For safety reasons, the monitor should be opened only by qualified service personnel.***

Opening the Back Cover

To open the back cover, follow the steps below.

- 1 Turn off the computer to which the monitor is connected.
- 2 Turn off the monitor.
- 3 Unplug the monitor from its power source.
- 4 Disconnect the cables attached to the left side of the monitor:
 - Power Input cable
 - Touchscreen cable
 - Analog Video Input cable
 - Ground cable
- 5 Remove the monitor from its enclosure or arm.
- 6 Place the monitor face down on a static dissipative mat in a location free from dirt and moisture and protected against static discharge.
- 7 Remove the retaining nuts that secure the back cover, as shown in Figure 4-1. There are 12 retaining screws on 15" units and 16 retaining nuts on 17" units.

Figure 4-1b: Tilt Angle



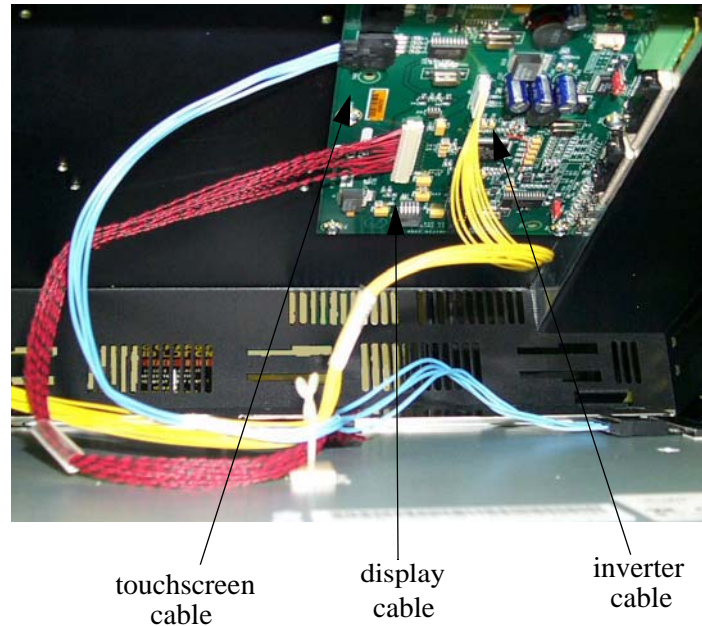
- 8 Slowly tilt the back cover just enough to gain access to the internal cables that connect to it.

Important: Be careful not to lift the back cover too quickly and accidentally pull the cables off of the board.



- 9 Disconnect the touchscreen, display and inverter board cables from their connectors as shown in Figure 4-2. Be sure to disconnect the cables from the end located on the backshell board.

- 10 Once the cables are disconnected, gently lift the backshell off the unit.
- 11 Proceed to the specific maintenance or troubleshooting procedures you need to perform.

Closing the Backshell

- 1 Carefully connect the touchscreen, display and inverter board cables to their respective connectors (see Figure 4-2). Be sure you orient the cables so that you do not bend their pins.
- 2 Secure the backshell to the unit using the retaining screws or nuts removed earlier. There are 12 retaining screws on 15" units and 16 retaining nuts on 17" units.
- 3 Reinstall the unit in its enclosure or on its arm.
- 4 Reattach the power input cable, touchscreen cable, video input cable and the ground cable at the left side of the monitor.
- 5 Reconnect the monitor to a power source.
- 6 Turn on the computer and the monitor.

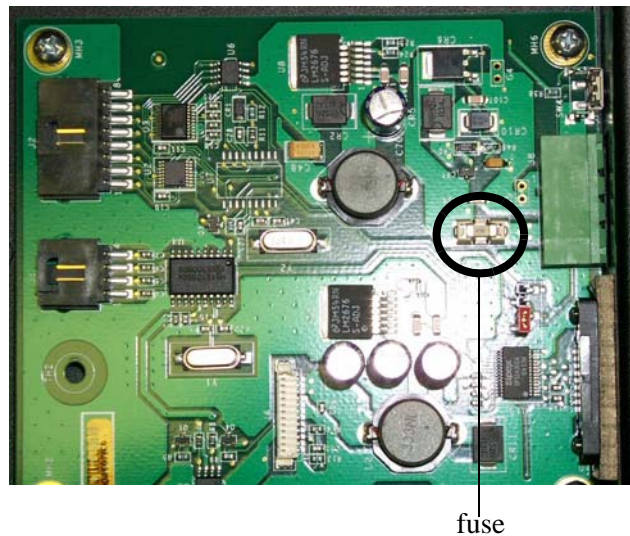
Replacing a Fuse

The monitor has a protective fuse that you can replace by opening up the backshell. An ohm meter is required to see whether the fuse is open or closed.

To replace the fuse, complete the following steps:

- 1 Open the backshell of the monitor (see the instructions for *Opening the Back Cover* on page 4-3).
- 2 Locate the fuse on the board according to Figure 4-3, below.

- 3 Use an ohm meter to see if the fuse is open or closed.
 - If open, use a pair of needlenose pliers to lift the fuse from the fuse holder.
 - If closed, the fuse is okay and there is no need to replace it.
- 4 To replace the fuse, use a Littlefuse Nano SMF Very Fast-Acting Type fuse. The part number is **R451 004**. This is a 4 amp fuse.



Caution Using a fuse that is rated differently than indicated here can cause damage or fire to occur.

- 5 Insert the new fuse into the fuse holder and reassemble the unit.
- 6 Close the backshell of the monitor (see the instructions for *Closing the Backshell* on page 4-4).

Resolving Common Problems

This section provides some basic troubleshooting procedures to help identify and correct problems you may have with the monitor. Each problem is described, followed by one or more possible solutions. Begin with the first solution and continue until you have solved the problem or tried all of the solutions.

If you cannot solve the problem yourself, or if you encounter a problem that is not documented in this section, contact your Parker-CTC distributor, check the Support page on the CTC website www.ctcusa.com, or call our Technical Support department at 513-248-1714.

Problems with Display Operation

A number of circumstances can cause problems in display operation. Here are some common problems and their solutions.

Computer is on, the video cable is connected, but the screen is blank.

- 1 The PC may be in screen saver mode or video "low power" mode. Touch the touchscreen (be careful not to activate a tool within your HMI software), move the mouse, or press a keyboard key to restore the image.
- 2 The monitor fuse has blown. Replace the fuse (see the instructions for *Replacing a Fuse* on page 4-5).

Caution If the monitor is exposed to a power supply voltage over 30VDC, its built-in protection will blow the fuse. In this case, you must correct the cause of the over-voltage.



The touchscreen does not work properly, or calibration seems incorrect.

- 1 The computer wasn't restarted after installing the touchscreen drivers or after adjusting the touchscreen settings. Restart the computer.
- 2 Touchscreen calibration might be in error. Recalibrate the touchscreen (see *Step 2: Calibrating the Touchscreen* in Chapter 3, for details).
- 3 The touchscreen drivers may have been installed incorrectly. Go to *Step 1: Installing the Touchscreen Driver* on page 3-4, for help reinstalling the driver. Refer to the *Readme* file located in the C:\drivers\touch directory.

After calibrating the touchscreen, it does not work or follow your finger.

- 1 The touchscreen cable may be loose or improperly connected. Make sure that the touchscreen cable is properly connected.
- 2 The touchscreen cable may be damaged. Contact Parker-CTC Product Technical Support at 513-248-1714 about having the cable replaced.
- 3 The touchscreen may be damaged. Contact Parker-CTC Product Technical Support at 513-248-1714 about having the touchscreen replaced.
- 4 Cables or wiring inside the monitor may be damaged. Contact Parker-CTC Product Technical Support at 513-248-1714.

Problems with the Displayed Image

A combination of incorrect on-screen display (OSD) adjustments can cause problems with the displayed image. In this circumstance, a good first step toward a solution is to select the Auto Setup icon in your OSD to automatically set the adjustments to their optimum settings for your particular computer. This sets up your monitor with standard video timings and provides a good starting place for fine-tuning adjustments.

Image does not fill the screen.

The current video mode has a resolution less than the monitor's pixel format. For example, the video mode is 640 X 480, and the monitor's pixel format is 800 X 600. Select the **Auto Setup** selection in the OSD.

Image extends beyond the screen.

- 1 Select the **Auto Setup** selection in the OSD. Follow the steps below to fine tune these settings.
- 2 To fine tune the horizontal and/or vertical position for the current video mode, use the **Horizontal Position** and/or **Vertical Position** selection to center the image on the screen.
- 3 To fine tune the horizontal size for the current video mode, use the **Clocks Adjust** selection to fit the image completely on the screen.

Characters shimmer or appear fuzzy.

- 1 Select the **Auto Setup** selection in the OSD. Follow the steps below to fine tune these settings.
- 2 To fine tune the clock phase for the current video mode, use the **Phase Adjust** selection to sharpen the image.
- 3 To fine tune the horizontal size for the current video mode, use the **Clocks Adjust** selection to fit the image completely on the screen.

Important This problem may occur if the horizontal size is adjusted by as little as one pixel too few or too many, so try to make as precise an adjustment as possible.

- 4 The current vertical refresh rate may not be optimal. If your computer's video card and driver supports it, change the vertical refresh rate until you find one that looks best with the monitor. This configuration is set within the **Control Panel → Display Settings** dialog.

When video mode is changed, the screen image shifts left or right.

The image's horizontal position has not been optimized for the new video mode. First select the **Auto Setup** selection, then use the **Horizontal Position** selection to fine tune centering the image horizontally on the screen.

When video mode is changed, the screen image shifts up or down.

The image's vertical position has not been optimized for the new video mode. First select the **Auto Setup** selection, then use the **Vertical Position** selection to center the image vertically on the screen.

Vertical bands appear in the image.

- 1 Select the **Auto Setup** selection in the OSD. Follow the steps below to fine tune these settings.
- 2 To fine tune the clock phase for the current video mode, use the **Phase Adjust** selection to sharpen the image.
- 3 To fine tune the horizontal size, use the **Clocks Adjust** selection to fit the image completely on the screen.

Important This problem may occur if the horizontal size is adjusted by as little as one pixel too few or too many, so try to make the adjustment as precise as possible.

- 4 The current vertical refresh rate may not be optimal. If your video card and driver supports it, change the vertical refresh rate until you find one that looks best with the monitor. This configuration is set within the **Control Panel → Display Settings** dialog.

Image appears faded or "washed out."

The image's contrast is set too high. First select the **Auto Setup** selection, then use the **Contrast** selection to lower the contrast setting.

Caution: Remember that the temperature within a protective enclosure is generally higher than the external temperature. Thus, if the monitor is operating inside an enclosure at temperature levels above its rated ambient temperature, you must cool the enclosure.

The monitor's power supply automatically detects the input voltage level and adjusts accordingly. However, always use reliable sources of power and isolate all communication cables from AC power lines to enhance noise immunity.

Important If possible, position the monitor away from machinery that produces intense electrical noise (arc welders, etc.). Otherwise, isolate the input power to the monitor from the equipment generating electrical noise.

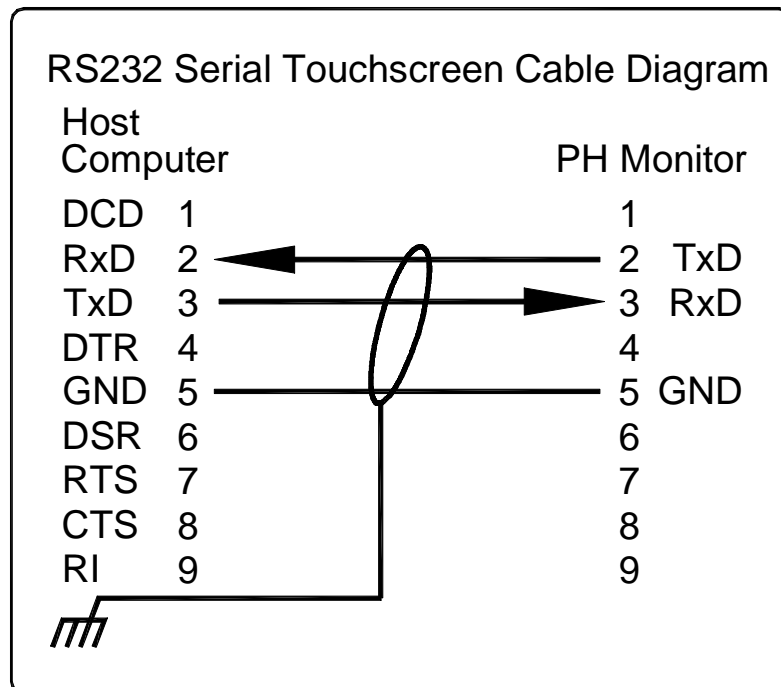

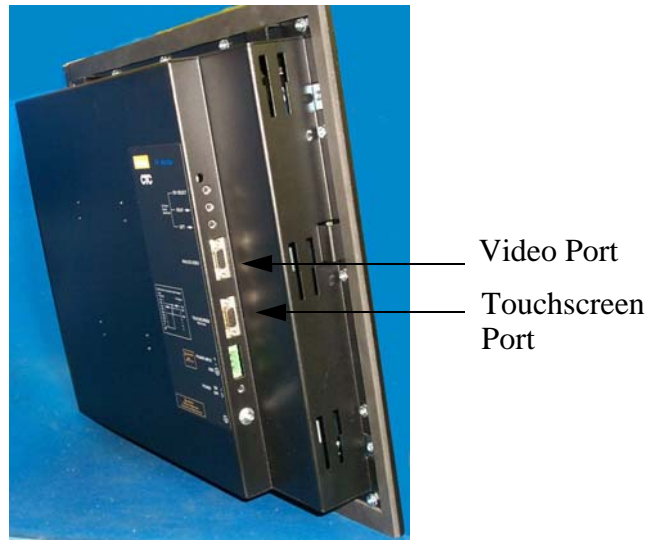

- 3 Connect the monitor to a computer. See *Connecting to a Non-display Computer* on page B-2, or *Connecting to Other Computers* on page 3-2, for details.
- 4 Start up the monitor. Refer to *Setting Up the Monitor* on page 3-4 for more information.
- 5 Install the touchscreen driver. See *Installing the Touchscreen Driver* on page B-2, for details on installing the UPDD driver.
- 6 Calibrate the touchscreen. Refer to *Calibrating the Touchscreen Driver* on page B-3, for more information.
- 7 Adjust the video image. See *Step 3: Adjusting the Video Image* on page 3-5, for details.

Connecting to a Non-display Computer

To connect your monitor to one of the non-display PowerStations, complete the following steps:

- 1 Connect the 15-pin video cable to the Analog Video Input port on both the monitor and the non-display PowerStation, see Figure B-1:.
- 2 Connect the 9-pin touchscreen cable to the Touchscreen port on the monitor and to the COM3(C) communication port.

Installing the Touchscreen Driver

If you purchased a CTC non-display PowerStation with your monitor, a touchscreen driver was installed in your PowerStation before it shipped.

If you are using your monitor with another computer, or if your system becomes damaged, you need to install (or reinstall) the touchscreen driver.

To install the 3M/Dynapro touchscreen driver, use the product CD that came with the monitor.

- 3 Load the CD. The PowerStation Utility CD menu is displayed.
- 4 Click on **Drivers** from the menu on the left-hand side of the screen. The Drivers menu is displayed.
- 5 Click on **PM1 Monitor**. The PM1 Monitor Driver menu is displayed.
- 6 Select either the **Parker-CTC PowerStation** or the **Generic Computer** button depending on the type of computer you are using. The UPDD driver installation is launched.
- 7 Follow the online instructions to install the touchscreen driver.

The touchscreen driver used with the PM1 monitor is the 3M/Dynapro UPDD driver. This driver is located on the CD that shipped with your monitor in the following folder:

Drivers → Touch → PM1

This driver is also located on the OS image in the following directory:

C:\UPDD

Review the *Install Readme.txt* file associated with the touchscreen driver for more information on installing it, if necessary.

Calibrating the Touchscreen Driver

Calibrating the touchscreen ensures that it is aligned with your display. The monitor's touchscreen is calibrated before leaving Parker-CTC. However, you may need to recalibrate the touchscreen when you begin using the monitor for the first time or whenever the cursor location and the location on the screen where the user touches do not match.

This section explains how to calibrate the 3M/Dynapro touchscreen driver under Windows 2000 and XP Professional.

To calibrate the touchscreen driver, complete the following steps:

- 1 Select **Start → Programs → UPDD → Calibrate**.
- 2 Touch the center of each "+" sign as they appear on the screen. A total of five "+" signs are displayed.
- 3 Move your finger across the monitor. The target should move with your finger, indicating that the calibration was successful.

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
